## CLASS HISTORY

### Class of 1969

Every senior class considers itself outstanding. Likewise, every senior class considers its members to be the most brilliant and the most unique ever to pass through the halls of the school. The Graduating Class of 1969 is no exception; we members feel justifiably proud of ourselves. The following facts, which are the results of a recent poll conducted by Mead Seniors, will help to point out some of our specifically excellent qualities and achievements.

Of our 189 seniors, 47 girls and 38 boys have made the Honor Roll at some time during their four high school years. When one adds these figures together, one arrives at the staggering total of 85. In other words, 44% of our seniors have been, at some time, Honor Roll Students. These figures take on an even greater significance when one realizes that 17 of our graduating students consider "simply graduating" the greatest achievement of their entire high school career.

Outside of school our students are equally as noteworthy. Twelve senior girls are engaged in "candy striping" or some other form of community service. Despite the great demands the school places upon students today, 36% of our seniors hold down outside jobs.

The future plans of Mead's 1969 Graduating Class are very impressive. A very large number of our seniors, 73% to be exact, hope to attend college or vocational school next year. Even more impressive, 12% of our graduates stated that they hope to enter the field of teaching. Thirtysix of our senior boys intend to enlist upon graduation, while three of our more patriotic boys stated that they intend to "do anything possible" to avoid active duty. It is interesting to note here that not one of our senior girls is considering service life, but 53% are anticipating marriage within the next year.

Mead is a fast-growing community. As a result, only 11% of the class has attended Mead Schools for 12 years. The remaining percent are from various parts of the United States including Louisiana, Illinois, Oklahoma and California. However, none of our graduates has ever attended a foreign school.

In conclusion, one other aspect of our senior students deserves mentioning. Of the 134 seniors who responded to our poll, only three had any type of criticism at all concerning Mead Senior High School or its faculty. When asked to sum up their feelings about their school, the majority stated that they were "proud to be a member of such a great school."
